

## Lesson 54: At the Hospital

### 1. Dialogue

*First, repeat after your tutor. Then, practice each role.*

Jack, the Medical Intern: What do we have here? (looking at a patient with a bloody cut on her hand)

Jack: I think three stitches will do. I promise it'll be quick and painless.

Azumi: Okay. Let's get right to it.

Jack: Are you allergic to any kind of medication?

Azumi: I remember having a skin test for the tetanus shot last year. It tested positive. So, please note that I can't have the anti-tetanus injection.
